Max and the Feather by Jane Brown, Executive Director

This is best done outside where the senses are fully ignited and young bodies are challenged by the uneven and unpredictable, ever-changing terrain." Twenty-month-old Max was on the beach. Amidst all the possibilities for him to tune in to, he chose a white feather. He picked it up, looked at it, stroked it, threw it, let it blow in the wind, and stepped

on it. He even tried to catch a seagull to put the feather where he thought it belonged. Ah, the joys of being a toddler. Ah, the joys of watching and learning from toddlers. It was my pleasure to be there and take part in this play.

He did not need me to be there in order to discover what he found out during those twenty minutes of feather, sand, and wind experiences. He did, however, want me to be there. Of all the things adults involved with a child must do well, tending to a child's healthy emotional development is the most important. All the toys and well-designed activities in the world cannot compensate for a lack of loving

interactions that foster a sense of security and well-being in young children.

I consider myself an early childhood expert. However, the more I am with young children, while observing, playing with and engaging them, the more I realize I have tons to learn about their development. I am energized and exhausted; filled with laughter and awe; focused yet detached. On one hand, I was

passionately involved with Max and his play; on the other hand, I just wanted to stand back and watch. But isn't that what being an expert means? We use what we know in our work with young

children and we continue to learn.

If you are a child care professional, do you sit back and assume you know it all...just take training to "get" the hours you "have" to in order to maintain the license or certification?

OR do you immerse yourself in professional development opportunities that help you grow, learn, and increase your passion for our industry? Do you always have some professional article or book you are in the midst of reading? Do you involve yourself in the play of the children in your care, yet stand back and observe what they are doing?

Important Recall Information

Sanofi US is voluntarily recalling all Auvi-Q® (epinephrine injection, USP). The recall involves all Auvi-Q currently on the market and includes both the 0.15 mg and 0.3 mg strengths for hospitals, retailers and consumers. This includes lot numbers 2081278 through 3037230, which expire October 2015 through December 2016. The products have been found to potentially have inaccurate dosage delivery, which may include failure to deliver drug.

Customers should immediately contact their health care provider (HCP) for a prescription for an alternate epinephrine auto-injector. In the event of a life-threatening allergic reaction (anaphylaxis), patients should only use their Auvi-Q device if another epinephrine auto-injector is not available, and then call 911 or local medical emergency services. Customers should contact their physician or HCP if they have experienced any problems that may be related to taking or using this drug product.

Tales for Tots, Reflections from a Volunteer Reader

I have been a volunteer reader for a "Tales for Tots" program at Tutor Time, a pre-school in Congers, New York, for the past two years. I was searching for ways to fill my retirement days after working for years as an early childhood teacher. The experience has been most gratifying for me and for the children, aged three to five, whom I read to every Friday morning.

I am continually receiving unending, inner joy from the children's enthusiastic responses to my half-hour of reading in each class. In addition to the several age-appropriate books I read, I include a CD of a song we sing along together and a finger puppet rhyme that coincides with the theme of books chosen for that day.

What has also become so pleasurable are the weekly visits I take to the local library to make my book selections. I can spend up to two peaceful hours browsing through the shelves in the children's room, searching for just the right story that will lend itself to reading aloud. The illustrations are another important aspect in my choice. I tailor

the books to a particular season or theme. And even as an adult, I am amazed at how many of life's lessons I keep learning about through these delightful children's tales.

This entire volunteer experience has taken on a very personal meaning for me. My mother had also been an early childhood teacher in Brooklyn for many years, when she was asked by her principal to leave the second grade classroom to start the first children's library in this elementary school.

She eagerly took on the assignment, having been an English major at Brooklyn College and an avid reader all her life. To become more competent, my mother immediately enrolled at Queens College to obtain a Masters in Library Science.

She was responsible for purchasing every book in the library and hand-wrote a Dewey Decimal card for each one - a true "labor of love." This was before the age of computers.

Reading to the children and spending time in the children's room of my local library keeps her memory alive for me and I feel I am honoring her legacy as a children's public school librarian. My mother would be so pleased to know I am sharing in her love of children's literature.

Also, as a mother of two single adult children, the unconditional love I receive from the children fills a void from the absence of grandchildren.

When I am away from the children during my three month winter

stay in Florida, I keep in touch with picture postcards of the beautiful beaches. On my return one spring, I was greeted with a huge crayon-drawn banner: "Welcome Back Miss Jane," that warmed my heart.

I encourage anyone who has the time, young or old, man or woman, to become involved in this genuinely "feel good" volunteer program. Not only will it bring positive, worthwhile meaning to your

life, but you will contribute to the well-documented, future educational success of every child you come in contact with, instilling in each "little precious mind," the love of reading forever!

Emergency Q & A

I am a Group Family Child Care provider and I recently saw in the news that only public schools are notified when a sex offender registers in our communities. Is this true? How can I also be made aware when this happens so I can keep the children in my care safe?

There are three levels of sex offenders, and all must register with local law enforcement. Levels one and two must update their photos every three years while level three offenders are required to update every 90 days.

The best protection you can provide to the children in your care is to be proactive and go onto the New York State Sex Offender Registry on a regular basis at www.criminaljustice.ny.gov/nsor.

Once in the site you can check out your area by entering the county name or zip code of the location. A list with photos and other information will come up on all registered sex offenders in this area. Or, for your convenience, CCRR has a link on our website that connects you to the NYS Criminal Justice System where you can register to receive automatic notifications when a sex offender moves into your location as well.

Another website that might be of interest to you is NY- Alert. Information about this site can be found in the Office of Children and Family Services' October 2015 Dear Provider Letter. The address is www.nyalert.gov/.

Infant and Toddler Corner: Behavior Management Toolkit

People often ask the Infant-toddler specialists, "What do I do about (hitting, dumping, ignoring, not helping, grabbing, biting ... CHOOSE ONE!)?"

Here are some easy and proven tools:

- 1.**THINK:** Could this have been prevented? Make sure expectations are realistic! Did I expect them to stay in a 20 minute circle time? Do I have only two dolls and expect eight children to share them?
- 2.**DESCRIBE** child's feelings (even before setting a limit). *You're feeling mad; you still can't hit Joseph.*

3.**EXPLAIN** how behavior affects others. When you bit him that hurt! When you handed her the crayon that made her SO happy!

- 4.Use **HUMOR**: Well, if you won't put on your coat, I will! Watch me get this thing on....
- 5.**IGNORE** minor misbehavior. (Children may grab, not listen, or otherwise display imperfect social skills. Ignoring the small stuff is often the right move!)
- 6.REDIRECTION All the spots at the sand table are filled. Want to do play-dough?

Consider these strategies for participating in children's play from High Scope Educational Research Foundation:

- Look for natural play openings as children explore materials, pretend and play games.
- 2. Join play on the child's level by squatting, kneeling, sitting or lying on the floor.
- Participate in parallel play by playing near the child, using the same materials in a similar manner.
- 4. Play as a partner with children by functioning as an equal or follower.
- 5. Refer players to one another.
- 6. Suggest new ideas within ongoing play situations.

I hope that you have a Max in your life who will keep you grounded in why we do what we do! I hope you have a Max in your life who will never forget you because you were so passionate about his or her play.

7.**ENCOURAGE** turn-taking. (Sharing isn't to be expected.)

8.**EXPLAIN** reasons for rules. *It will hurt* your friend if you wave the stick at him.

9. Give **SPECIFIC PRAISE** for the behavior you want to see, when you see it. I see that you were so careful of baby Anna on the floor....You two are really cooperating with the blocks!

10. Give **CHOICES** between two that are acceptable choices while maintaining the rules. You can sit at this table or that one. But you must sit down with your snack.

11.Find acceptable **ALTERNATIVES**You can't jump on the couch but you can jump on this green circle, or outside when we go out later.

Nutrition Corner: Let's Get Moving with Michelle Obama

It's not every day you see the First Lady of the United States Are you committed to improving the health of our children? If so, jumping around in a potato sack in the White House East Room, please join Let's Move at www.healthykidshealthyfuture.org todoing push-ups on the Ellen DeGeneres Show, or dancing with day. With your help, the dream of eliminating childhood obesity the likes of Jimmy Fallon and even Big Bird. However, these are just the kinds of things Michelle Obama has been up to since taking office. She has been on an ambitious mission to eliminate childhood obesity within a generation through her Let's Move obesity prevention initiative. The program has several arms to tackle the epidemic from all angles, including the Let's Move Child Care (LMCC) arm aiming to improve nutrition and physical activity early on in child care programs. Her willingness "to make a complete fool of myself," as she puts it, has been the cornerstone of the campaign's success, capturing the attention of tens of millions across the country. Her Evolution of Mom Dancing sketch with Jimmy Fallon, for example, has gone viral with nearly 25 million views to date. Yet despite the program's widespread publicity and the participation of over 12,000 child care programs, the program has been slow to catch on in our area, with just one participating program in all of Rockland County.

Thanks to initiatives such as Let's Move and the dedication of child care providers and others in the community, obesity in preschool children is declining for the first time in decades. Our joint efforts really do make a difference.

Michelle Obama explains how the problem of obesity often starts young and the role child care providers play in addressing it as early as possible. One in three of our nation's children are overweight or obese, and according to a recent study, more than half were overweight before their third birthday! In a video address directly to child care providers Mrs. Obama encourages programs of all shapes and sizes to get involved.

"Every day, our child care providers make critical decisions about the health of our youngest children, from the foods they eat to the exercise they get to the habits they learn—habits they might carry with them for the rest of their lives. You all are on the frontlines of our efforts to address our childhood obesity epidemic." - Michelle Obama

When you do so at www.healthykidshealthyfuture.org, you will be given access to free resources and activities to create and implement an action plan that will help you achieve each of the five LMCC goals and the 15 best practices that make them up.
