QUALITY INVESTMENTS FOR CHILDREN An Initiative Promoting Quality Early Experiences for All Children!

The NYS Early Care & Learning Council and the Child Care Resource & Referral network launched an initiative to encourage New Yorkers to support high quality early learning experiences in their communities. As part of the first phase—the *United to Promote Quality* campaign—we are working to bring an awareness to the Rockland County community.

We launched the campaign on June 2, 2017, at our Annual Meeting with the goal to improve quality and facilitate access to early care and education services throughout Rockland County. This year's event, as in years past, provided a platform for people to engage in a fruitful discussion about how we as a community can best serve our children At the event we hosted a discussion with members representing a cross section of the community who shared their perspectives on quality child care.

Alan Berger, owner, Peace Through Play Nursery School, begins each day by focusing on how he can improve the quality of his program, which is why he believes that the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) Accreditation is so important.

The love and nurturing that Meryl Barkin, Group Family Child Care Provider (Best Friends Family Child Care), brings to the children in her care extends to their families. Meryl knows she is doing her job well when parents tell her that when they walk into her program, they feel at home and are able to go to work with peace of mind knowing their children are in her care.

Rose Gabriel Leandre, Chief of Staff for NYS Assembly Member Ellen Jaffee, offered a parent perspective: "Quality child care means not having to break the bank. It's an affordable place that will provide my children with a diverse, safe and nurturing environment; and address their educational, emotional and cognitive needs. At the same time my children are happy, having fun, making friends, and learning a wide variety of things."



Sabrina Greco, Confidential Assistant to the Chair of the Rockland County Legislature, gave a government perspective: "Providing an understanding work environment that encourages and supports 'quality' will always benefit an employer, as parents are more productive when less worried about a sick child or child care issues. Parents need a support team to balance the needs of raising a family."

As a business owner, John Lagana, Treasurer for US Information Systems, shared this perspective, "I have observed that employees who utilize quality child care are among the best performers. This is likely because they are better able to focus on their work while comforted in the knowledge that their children are being cared for in a safe, stimulating and engaging environment for children. Conversely, employees who are constantly stressing to find a place or person to leave their child with, tend to be less focused on work and by extension less productive."

We all want our children to be healthy and safe, but quality is much more than that. Quality is not day long babysitting; quality helps a child to thrive. Isn't *that* what we all really want? 

Nurse's Notes: *Kristin G. Saunders, RN* CCRR & Rockland County Department of Health Partner on Low Sodium Grant

Did you know that children are consuming over 3,100mg of sodium per day in their diets? The recommended sodium intake for children is from 1,000mg – 1,200mg per day. Our bodies do require sodium in order to function but an overload of sodium is harmful to our health. Children who over consume salt tend to have high blood pressure and the harmful effects are even greater in children who are already obese. It is important to curb salt intake in the early years of life as children develop their palates during this time.

The Rockland County Department of Health and Child Care Resources of Rockland are working collaboratively through a grant to offer training and technical assistance to nine pre-selected Rockland County child care centers. Kristin G. Saunders, RN, and Teresa Ortega, CACFP Coordinator, have developed a curriculum for a seminar titled "Shake the Salt! Healthy Habits for Life." Three sessions will be presented to the staff at the nine centers.


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Each classroom represented at a seminar will receive low salt crackers and regular crackers to conduct a taste test with their children. They will also receive an indoor window sill herb garden to use in activities, demonstrating other ways besides using salt to enhance snacks.

Paid Family Leave Act: What You Need to Know!

I heard that on January 1, 2018, New York will institute the Paid Family Leave Act. What does this mean for me as an employer?

What it means is that there will be a guarantee of up to 12 weeks of leave with job security when someone has to care for a new child, or a seriously ill family member, or to meet certain needs related to a family member's military deployment.

Once fully phased in, employees taking leave will receive benefits equal to 67% of their wages. The leave will be paid for by employees through small payroll deductions estimated to be 70 cents to start, rising to \$1.47 in 2021. PreK Update for the 2017-2018 School Year



CCRR administers PreK services for the following Rockland County school districts: Clarkstown, Nanuet, North Rockland, Nyack, Pearl River, Ramapo Central, and South Orangetown. A lottery was conducted for each school district mid-April by several Board members—none of which had a child eligible for PreK. All seven school district slots are full for the 2017-18 school year. There were 222 children on the wait list as of late June.

Child Care Resources of Rockland is one of the partners in the Creating Breastfeeding Friendly Communities with the Rockland County Department of Health in order to guide and support breastfeeding in child care settings. Breastfeeding is beneficial to both mother and child, creating a nurturing bond during the postpartum period and beyond. Breastfed babies are happy and healthy due to the most natural form of nourishment, produced by mothers.

Our goal is to help family and group family child care programs and child care centers through the process of becoming Breastfeeding Friendly designated sites.

We are currently working with the following Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) participants in the Ramapo and Clarkstown areas:

of Play Inc., Shapiro's LLC, Interaction Child Care LLC, Little Sprouts Family Day Care, Teacher Mommy Daycare, Inc., and Kidsnett Child Care Program.

Participating sites that complete a self -evaluation, take a training on the importance of breastfeeding, develop a breastfeeding friendly program policy and set up a designated area for moms to breastfeed will receive the designation of *Breastfeeding Friendly* Child Care site. They will also receive informational materials to display, picture books for their classrooms and a program celebration to mark their designation! The center/home will be listed on the NYS Department of Health website as Breastfeeding Friendly. In addition, meals containing breast milk are reimbursed by CACFP.

With a positive word-of-mouth and supportive environment on breastfeeding, designated Breastfeeding Friendly child care settings provide an encouraging atmosphere for mothers and staff members. alike.

15 Essential QIC Messages about Quality

What we mean by "Quality" is high quality early learning experiences that help a child thrive.

Quality can also be described as those events, activities, environments, relationships, and factors that have a positive impact on a young child's cognitive, physical, social, and emotional development

Quality involves more than simply the custodial care very often associated with "babysitting,"

- Quality can have a particularly positive *impact* for young children whose families experience racial, cultural, and/or economic inequity.
- Quality prepares young children for success in school, job training, employment, and community life.
- *Quality* serves young *children*, as well as *parents/guardians* who might be less effective in their jobs without access to *Quality* for their children. In turn, *employers* benefit by the enhanced performance of their workers.
- *Quality* is about the *future*, as well as the present. Without *Quality* there will not be an educated, competent, and professional "next generation *workforce*" for tomorrow.
- *Quality* impacts young children in all settings, including the home environment. *Quality* is enhanced by a woven fabric of social supports, such as home visiting, early intervention, nutrition services, paid family leave, and equitable employment opportunities, which all help a child and family to *thrive*.
- *Quality* is *vital* for young children, families, and communities, so the **United to Promote Quality** state-wide campaign is intended to educate *whole communities* including families, early learning service providers, businesses, & community leaders about the importance of *Quality*.
- Quality awareness is the goal of the United to Promote Quality partnership between the Early Care and Learning Council, Child Care Resource & Referral agencies, For Our Babies NY, and other allies.

Quality awareness efforts within a community will demonstrate how:

- Quality promotes "robust brain development" over the first 4 years of life
- Quality gives "peace of mind" to parents/guardians, so they can be more focused & productive employees
- Quality "lays the strong foundation" for the future economic development of our communities, state, and nation by better preparing children to become successful in school, work, and life

Quality in an early learning program has many essential elements, including:

Highly **skilled** staff

Age-*appropriate* curricula

Language-rich environment

Warm and responsive interactions between staff and children

High and consistent levels of child participation

Small class sizes and low child-to-adult ratios

Quality can be *measured* and *improved* through **QUALITYstarsNY**, a comprehensive and evidence-based Quality Rating & Improvement System, for which *resources* are needed to complete NY's implementation.

Quality awareness in a community will result in a *commitment* of new resources for *Quality*, such as new volunteers, grants from local donors, in-kind support from businesses, and advocacy by community leaders.

Quality awareness is a "team sport." Everyone can play a role to increase awareness & commitments for Quality.

Infants Know Your Infant

Infants are as different as snowflakes and each develop at a unique rate. They learn through touch, sight, sound, taste and smell. They begin to learn about relationships and trust through their experiences with those around them. An early sense of trust can help infants experience positive relationships throughout their lives. By 4 to 5 months baby will attempt to grasp objects and watch his or her feet wiggle.

Activity: I Can Make Sounds When I Kick

This activity promotes body awareness, cause and effect, and sensory integration



Materials Needed: Tissue Paper **What to Do:** Tuck one or two sheets of new or used tissue paper under the cushion of a sofa or upholstered chair so that it hangs down to the floor like a curtain. Remove baby's socks, and place her on her back, with her feet against the tissue and her knees slightly bent. If she's slow to start kicking, gently rustle the paper with your hand or tap her feet against it. You can vary this activity with kicking other textures or an object that makes sounds when kicked. http://www.parents.com

Finger Play Activity: A tiny, tiny worm (wiggle index finger like a worm) wiggled along like this, Without a sound, it came to a tiny hole (make a circle with your thumb and index finger), A tiny hole in the ground, It wiggled right inside, without a sound (wiggle finger up baby's arm and tickle).

Toddlers Know Your Toddler

Toddlers climb up on the kitchen table for the obvious reason; because it's there. They are trying to find a balance between risk and challenge. Climbing is an important physical milestone. Provide opportunities for climbing through outdoor play sets. If providing climbing indoors put couch cushions on the floor or make an obstacle course with pillows, perhaps in a play room where activities can be left out. Toddlers love tunnels to crawl through. Don't forget to continually observe your toddler in active play to assure safety.

Activity: Let's Balance on our Bubble Wrap

 Materials: Bubble wrap from packaging, colorful masking tape.

Preschoolers Know Your Preschooler

From moving game pieces to running around in the yard, climbing and balancing in the playground and even jumping on the bed, children demonstrate a range of motor skills they are learning and how well they are using these skills to interact with the world around them. Appropriate physical activity supplies includes hula hoops, bean bags, tricycles, large beach balls and child size basketball hoops.

Finger Play: "I'm All Full of Hinges"- I'm all full of hinges and everything bends, (explore joints with child), From the top of my head (hands on head) way down to my ends. (hands on toes), I'm hinges in front (bend forward), I'm hinges in back (bend back). If I didn't have hinges, I think I would crack!

Activity: Learning Letters

In preschool your child will be immersed in a world of structured learning and social interaction. Playing games and activities that challenge and develop physical abilities will be part of the day. This activity promotes learning letter names, recognizing shapes and linking letters with the sounds of spoken language.

Materials: black marker with thick point, cardboard squares, playdough, a plastic knife and child size scissors. Present the child with cardboard cards marked with the alphabet in large let-



ters. Have playdough available to shape onto the letters. The preschooler can put the letters together that spell his or her name or you can use this activity for physical movement by calling out the letter that your child should jump on. The child can chant this verse while jumping on the letters you call out: "I know all my letters, you can't fool me. I can find them all just wait and see."

Letter Box: When introducing a new letter to your child, set out a card box with a letter card attached to the front. Help your child find items in your home that begin with the sound of that letter.

School Agers Know Your School Ager

The school age years (5-8) are considered a time of eager exploration and discovery. Regular contact with the larger world will expand your child's world beyond the family environment. This is critical for establishing independence, gaining confidence and forming new friendships.

Follow your child's interest and develop an activity on this interest. If your child enjoys crafts a popular one is yarn balls.

Activity: Yarn Balls

Materials: yarn, white glue, round balloon, scissors, flat tray



Take a flat tray (at least 1 inch height), Mix equal amounts of white glue and water, Soak the yarn into the water-glue mixture without cutting the yarn from the bundle. Blow up a small round shaped balloon. Place paper or old newspaper to protect your craft space. Start wrapping the glued yarn around the balloon randomly. Cover the whole balloon evenly with the yarn and try to create a nice and even pattern. After the glue dries make sure to free the yarn from the balloon by pushing the balloon on places where it is joined to the yarn, otherwise it will ruin the yarn ball after popping the balloon. Finally, pop the balloon and take it out from the yarn hell.
