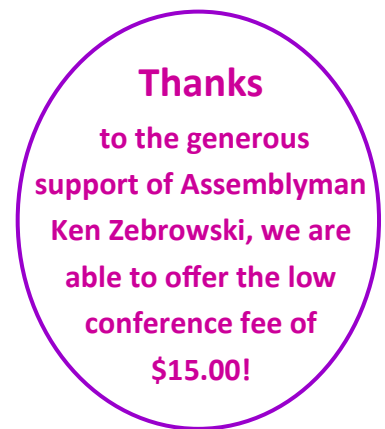

DIRECTIONS TO ST. THOMAS AQUINAS COLLEGE: 125 Route 340, Sparkill, NY 10976

FROM NEW YORK CITY VIA THE GEORGE WASHINGTON BRIDGE: Bear right crossing the George Washington Bridge, following signs to the Palisades Interstate Parkway. Travel north to Exit 5N (Orangeburg-Route 303 North). Follow the local directions below.

FROM NEW JERSEY AND PENNSYLVANIA VIA GARDEN STATE PARKWAY: Follow the Garden State Parkway to the end onto the New York State Thruway. Follow the New York State Thruway to Exit 13 South (Palisades Interstate Parkway South). Travel south to Exit 5N. Follow the local directions below.

FROM WESTCHESTER AND CONNECTICUT VIA MARIO CUOMO (TAPPAN ZEE) BRIDGE: Take the New York State Thruway to Exit 13S. Follow Palisades Parkway south to Exit 5N, and follow local directions below.

FROM UPSTATE NEW YORK VIA ROUTE 17 (SOUTH): Take Route 17 South to the New York State Thruway. Follow the New York State Thruway to Exit 13S. Take Palisades Parkway south to Exit 5N. Follow the local directions below.

LOCAL DIRECTIONS: Coming off the Palisades Parkway, bear right off the ramp and go north on Route 303 to the second traffic light. Turn right onto Route 340. Follow Route 340 to the first traffic light and turn left into the Main Campus entrance. Park in the parking lot adjacent to the tennis courts.
