Child Care Resources of Rockland, Inc. is a contract agency of the County of Rockland, NYS Office of Children and Family Services, NYS Department of Health, and the United Way of Rockland County. Additional funding for Special Needs Services is provided by the Office for People With Developmental Disabilities. We are also supported by our members. Child Care Resources of Rockland, Inc. is Best Practices Certified by the New York State Standards of Excellence Certification Program for The Field of Child Care Resource and Referral.





CCRR HISTORY

Founded in 1974 as the Day Care and Child Development Council of Rockland, the agency was formed by Phyllis Helbraun with a grant from The National Council of Jewish Women, Rockland Section, to advocate for better child care funding, higher standards, and improved program development. Phyllis was a lifelong champion of women, children, and families. In its first five years, the Council established an Annual Early Childhood Conference, in collaboration with Rockland Community College, began developing family child care homes and helped hundreds of families locate child care services.

Throughout the 80s and 90s, the agency helped to promote and increase the number of early care and education and school age care programs. It established the Child Development Associate (CDA) Program at Rockland Community College, started the North Rockland School Age Care Program, assumed responsibility for administering the Child and Adult Care Food Program for family child care providers, and solidified its position as a prominent source of child care resource and referral information for families.



The agency also began offering respite and support services for families of children with special needs who needed child care. It further expanded its family support services to include elder care services and emergency back-up care. As the agency moved into the 21st Century, the Helen Bernstein Memorial Library was established in order to serve the early childhood community with appropriate professional resources and children's literature. The Rockland County Executive and Legislature funded the county-wide Quality Child Care Campaign to help child care programs become nationally accredited. All eight school districts contracted with CCRR to administer their Universal Pre-Kindergarten programs. Today, Child Care Resources of Rockland, Inc. celebrates 50 years of service and employs a staff of 20 dedicated individuals.

CCRR provides professional development and training for all potential and existing early care and education professionals and programs that serve children, birth through school age and birth through 21 years if the child has a special need. Funded by the Office for People with Developmental Disabilities, we offer specialized professional development designed to offer training and technical assistance to a number of programs willing to commit to intensive examination of their environment, programming and practices to improve retention of children with special needs in their programs, especially those who exhibit challenging behaviors.

CCRR serves the NYS Office of Children and Family Services as the licensing agent for family child care and school age care programs, child care resource and referral agency, the Legally Exempt Enrollment Agency, Business and Stabilization support and by providing Child Care Health Services. CCRR partners with the United Way of Rockland to administer a unique child care tuition scholarship program.

Child Care Resources of Rockland, Inc. remains firm in its commitment to build capacity, improve quality and facilitate access to early care and education services in the community.

ADVOCACY

Child Care Resources of Rockland, Inc. (CCRR) is celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2024. Fifty years of advocating for quality and affordable child care. The mission of the organization has been to promote, support and enhance the healthy development of all children by providing resource and referral services for families seeking accessible, affordable, quality early childhood and school age care and education. Child Care Resources of Rockland, Inc. believes all children deserve quality child care and early childhood education. Now more than ever, early childhood education is crucial to the overall well-being and development of a child. Healthy development in the early years (particularly birth to three) provides the building blocks for educational achievement, economic productivity, responsible citizenship, lifelong health, strong communities, and successful parenting of the next generation (Center on the Developing Child, 2007). By supporting our children from birth through the school years, we build an essential foundation for our families, schools, businesses, and communities.

Early childhood education should not be a privilege. It should be available to every child, every family, despite one's socioeconomic status. Research has shown the difference between a child who receives early childhood education and a child who does not receive early childhood education with stark differences. A child that has been exposed to language and socialization, versus a child with no exposure to language or socialization reacts vastly differently when placed in an education setting. According to the Center on the Developing Child at Harvard University, "Parents want the best for their children, but those living in poverty face the unrelenting demands of struggling to provide adequate food, housing, health care, and education for their children. When children are exposed to an extreme version of this environment, they experience a prolonged activation of their stress response systems – what scientist have termed "toxic stress" – which can affect their growth and development."

The basic architecture of the brain is constructed through an ongoing process that begins before birth and continues into adulthood. Early experiences affect the quality of that architecture by establishing either a sturdy or a fragile foundation for all of the learning, health and behavior that follow (Center on the Developing Child, 2007). The Annie E. Casey Foundation (2013) aptly explains, "What happens to children during those critical first years will determine whether their maturing brain has a sturdy foundation or a fragile one." It is our responsibility to advocate on behalf of all children, so they receive quality early childhood education, allowing them to fulfill their future goals, armed with knowledge, confidence, and strength.

BEEF VEGETABLE SOUP > USDA RECIPE FOR CHILD CARE CENTERS

Beef Vegetable Soup is a delicious and nutritious combination of carrots, green beans, canned diced tomatoes, celery and onions, all simmered in a rich beef broth. CACFP Home Child Care Crediting Information: 1 cup (8 fl oz ladle) provides % cup vegetable (¼ cup red/orange vegetable, ½ cup other vegetable), and 1 oz equivalent meat.

Preparation Time: 20 minutes Cooking Time: 30 minutes Makes: 6 servings

Ingredients

- ¾ cup or 7 oz Raw ground beef no more than 10% fat
- 2 cups or 16 oz Low-sodium beef broth
- 2 cups or 13 oz Canned no-salt-added diced tomatoes, undrained
- 1/2 cup or 2 oz Fresh celery, chopped
- ½ cup or 2 oz Fresh onions, chopped
- ½ tsp Salt
- 1/8 tsp Ground black pepper
- 1 tsp Onion powder
- · 1 tsp Salt-free seasoning
- 2 ¼ tsp Garlic powder
- 1/8 tsp Dried parsley
- 2 1/4 tsp Ancho chili powder

Or

- 2 ¼ tsp Mexican seasoning mix (See Notes Section)
- ¾ cup or 3 oz Frozen corn
- 1 cup or 5 oz Frozen peas and carrots
- ¾ cup or 2 oz Frozen green beans



Directions

- 1. Place ground beef in a large pot. Heat over high heat uncovered for 5-8 minutes. Stir often until meat is well done.
- 2. Critical Control Point: Heat to 165 °F or higher for at least 15 seconds
- 3. Remove meat from heat. Drain beef in a colander.
- 4. Return meat to heat.
- 5. Add beef broth, tomatoes, celery, onions, salt, pepper, onion powder, salt-free seasoning, garlic powder, parsley and ancho chili powder. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium and cover. Simmer for 20 minutes.
- 6. Add corn, peas and carrots, and green beans.
- 7. Cover and simmer over medium heat for 15 minutes or until vegetables are tender.
- 8. Critical Control Point: Heat to 165 °F or higher for at least 15 seconds.
- 9. Pour soup into a large soup bowl.
- 10. Critical Control Point: Hold at 140 °F or higher until served.
- 11. Serve 1 cup (portion with 1 cup measuring cup or 8 fl oz ladle).



PHYSICAL ACTIVITY AND NUTRITION



Dancing is a fun way to get children moving and to develop their balance, coordination, and flexibility. Learning to balance, move smoothly, and stretch your body is critical for children. It's like laying the foundation for being powerful and intelligent. These abilities enable you to stay healthy, have fun, and feel wonderful, a great foundation for a healthy and happy childhood.





Eating a balanced diet can also improve children's mood and behavior. Children who eat a diet high in sugar and processed foods may experience more mood swings and behavioral problems. Scientists have been studying this, and they've found that what kids eat might be linked to how they behave. So, if a kid doesn't eat healthy food, they might act in ways that are more difficult for parents and teachers to handle. Eating good food is important!

What is FAMS, and how do I get access to it?

Answer:

FAMS stands for Facility Application Management System, which is a New York State Office of Children and Family Services data system we are all using or will be using in the future for completing and submitting renewal applications and completing Child Care Background Checks, (CBC's). Centers and School Age Centers are already using FAMS. Group Family and Family Child Care programs will be transitioning over soon. Look for an invitation from your licensor or registrar via email and respond to this promptly as it does have an expiration date. If you miss the due date, contact your registrar (845) 425-0009 x475 or licensor (845) 708-2400 to resend the invitation. If you are still not sure or have questions, please call us at (845) 425-0009 x0 and ask to speak to someone in registration.

Legally Exempt Child Care Provider: Would You Like to Increase Your Income?

You can add funds to your income by taking ten additional hours of approved training. You will then qualify to receive the Enhanced Rate for child care. You can also participate in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). This program will help you with food expenses for children in care. In some cases, with the food expenses for your own children.


Activity Ideas for Preschoolers

Winter is here, and children are fascinated with ice and snow. Playing outside is not always an option, but there are ways to bring the winter experience inside.


Sometimes bringing in some snow, putting it in a container, and observing what happens as it warms is enough. One fun activity is painting with ice. Simply put water in an ice cube tray or small paper cups, add a healthy amount of food coloring or tempera paint, insert a popsicle stick, and freeze. Supply paper, and children ho!d by the stick and create paintings as the ice paint melts.



Always easy is cutting out paper snowflakes. These can be made using square paper (or a coffee filter for easier cutting.) After folding, children cut around the edges, being careful not to cut all the way through. As with real snowflakes, no two are alike, and the use of scissors strengthens hand muscles for writing and drawing skills.











Another activity is making button snowflakes. You will need three popsicle sticks, white glue, white or blue paint, if desired, and an assortment of buttons. Pre-glue the sticks and let dry. Paint the sticks if desired then glue on an assortment of buttons. Glue on some ribbon if you like to make an ornament.



School Aged Activity (Parent Friendly)

Nature Pattern Creating Fun:

Use items like rocks, leaves, twigs, or pinecones to create patterns. Start with simple ABAB patterns, like 'stick leaf stick leaf'. Then progress to more complex patterns like AABAAB like 'stick stick leaf stick stick leaf'. When your youngster needs more of a challenge move on to ABCABC, like 'stick leaf rock stick leaf rock'! Also allow your child to create their own pattern ideas. Remember, a pattern is a pattern when it repeats.

Supporting math learning at home for your youngsters can be a fun and engaging process.
